The course provides a problematic treatment of the fundamental categories for analysing and understanding the family as a social phenomenon, understood as a sui generis, speciesspecific social relationship of full reciprocity between the sexes and between generations. After a presentation of the indicators of change in the family and the pluralisation of new family forms, the course focuses on the axiological dimensions of the family: gender identity, the relationship between generations and the couple. This is followed by an in-depth module on the relational poverty of the family, which presents theoretical reflections and operational indications on how to support the relationality of the family as the basic cell of society.

11. Learning objectives

The objective of the course is to provide students with know-ledge of the family as the basic cell of society, according to the sociological perspective, in order to develop in students an adequate awareness of the challenges that families face today, in order to promote and guide socio-educational practice.

Specifically, the teaching objectives are:

- lead students to master the use of the sociological perspective in reading the profound transformations that have affected the family in recent decades;
- argue the presentation of the relational approach to the reading of the change of the family in society, according to which the family can be recognised as a social relationship, neither replaceable nor confusable with anything else, of full reciprocity between the sexes and generations;
- lead students to recognise and argue the development and understanding of family dynamics through theories of social morphogenesis that enable them to understand the processes of differentiation active in contemporary societies;
- confronting the phenomenon of specific relational poverty that crosses the direct distinctions of family dimensions: the alliance between the genders of the couple's relationship and the relationships between generations, both from a theoretical and operational point of view;
- confront empirical evidence from research conducted on family and childhood in order to gain a clear view of the relevance of certain social phenomena.

12. Expected Learning outcomes

Knowledge and understanding

By the end of the course, the student will be able to understand the main subject areas of sociological analysis of the family:

- the social reasons for the family,
- the family in the horizon of history
- male and female identity,
- the couple and the family,
- the family as a relational asset,
- the relational poverty of the family.

Ability to apply knowledge and understanding

By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

- Use the skills acquired in the field of sociology to recognise and read family social phenomena as social relations and as networks of relations between genders and generations;
- choose and use, in different situations, the most appropriate tools (of theoretical analysis, of relational analysis, of family culture, of relational poverty, etc.) to read the social changes impacting on the family, drawing on the skills acquired in the field of sociology.

Autonomy of judgement:

At the end of the course, the student must:

- demonstrate competence in analysing and interpreting social change impacting on the family today

Communication skills:

The student will be able to

- clearly present, using the technical language of the discipline, the results of individual study and research.

14. Teaching Methods

The course includes:

- didactic delivery: 2 hours of videolessons per CFU with synchronous slide display and the possibility of integrating lectures in web conferences and/or pre-structured courseware (digitally usable teaching materials);
- Interactive teaching: one structured e-activity per CFU, i.e. a didactic forum containing one thread per CFU and the possibility of integrating short interventions in digital discussion environments (blog, web forum, wiki); other structured e-activities, individual or collaborative (report, exercise, case study, problem solving, web quest, project, artefact production). Use of teaching materials (slides) for study and a database for practice with open and closed questions and self-assessment tests.

The content of the framework deals with issues related to the European Union's Sustainable Development Strategy, both in order to learn about the long-term plan for policy coordination for sustainable development at the economic, social and environmental levels, as well as concrete measures affecting all dimensions of development.

17. Means of Testing Learning

The test consists of thirty closed-ended questions. Each closed answer corresponds to 1 point if correct, 0 points if incorrect. A mark of 0 to 2 points will be awarded for participation in the etivities, according to the following values: 0 = insufficient participation, 1 = sufficient participation, 2 = active participation. This score will be added to the final grade.

The final grade is expressed in thirtieths and ranges from 1 to 30 with distinction, according to the following intervals: 1-17, insufficient; 18-21, sufficient; 22-24, fair; 25-27, good; 28-29, very good; 30-30 with distinction, excellent.
